

Brexit preparedness: provisional agreement reached on amending EU rules in the area of type-approvals for vehicles

This is an example of one of the Commission's Brexit preparedness proposals for measures that must be adopted irrespective of whether the United Kingdom's withdrawal from the European Union is orderly or otherwise.

Today's provisional agreement means that current manufacturers holding UK type-approvals will be allowed to apply – before the UK's withdrawal from the EU – to EU27 authorities for new type-approval. It will provide legal clarity, ensure business continuity, and avoid an unnecessary administrative burden on manufacturers.

Following this provisional agreement, the text of the Regulation will have to be formally approved by the European Parliament and the Council. Once endorsed by both co-legislators in the coming weeks, the Regulation will be published in the Official Journal of the Union and will enter into force on the third day after its publication.

Background

On 4 June 2018, the European Commission proposed [a Regulation](#) complementing EU rules in the area of type-approvals for vehicles. This is part of the Commission's ongoing preparedness work in the context of Brexit, and follows two stakeholder notices published on [8 February](#) and [28 March 2018](#).

Type-approval is the procedure for certifying that a vehicle meets all applicable requirements related to safety and emissions. Under EU law, the approval of a vehicle type in one EU country is valid EU-wide without the need for further tests and re-certification in other Member States.

After the United Kingdom's withdrawal from the EU (or at the end of the transition period, if the Withdrawal Agreement is ratified), the UK type-approval authority will no longer be a national authority of an EU Member State. Therefore – without prejudice to the discussions on the future EU-UK relationship – it will no longer be possible for manufacturers to place vehicles on the EU27 market on the basis of type-approvals granted in the UK.

Reaching an agreement with the UK Government on the terms of the Withdrawal Agreement and the Political Declaration on the framework of the future relationship is not a guarantee that the United Kingdom will ratify the Withdrawal Agreement by 29 March 2019. It continues to be essential that business operators prepare themselves for the UK's withdrawal – whatever the outcome.

Presidents Juncker and Tusk at the G20 Summit in Buenos Aires

European Commission President Jean-Claude **Juncker** and European Council President Donald Tusk will represent the European Union at this year’s G20 Summit, under the Argentinian Presidency in Buenos Aires. The theme of this year’s Summit is “Building consensus for fair and sustainable development”. Along with the EU, leaders from 19 countries (Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Canada, China, Germany, France, India, Indonesia, Italy, Japan, Mexico, Russia, Saudi Arabia, South Africa, South Korea, Turkey, the United Kingdom and the United States) will gather to mark the 10-year anniversary of the G20 and discuss key topics on the global agenda, ranging from globalisation, trade and economics to climate change, migration and the fight against terrorism. In a [joint letter](#) to Heads of State or Government ahead of the Summit, Presidents **Juncker** and Tusk set out the central role that the European Union is playing in shaping global affairs and championing multilateralism. They set out the EU’s key priorities for this year’s G20: Fair Globalisation and Trade, Stepping up our commitment to ambitious climate action, Harnessing the future of work, Building a more resilient international monetary and financial system, and Delivering on G20 commitments on counter-terrorism. President **Juncker** will take part in a joint press conference with President Tusk, currently planned on Friday 30 November at 9.00 (local time), ahead of the first of the two days of the Summit (exact time to be confirmed). Le plan Juncker soutient des micro-entrepreneurs en Italie et une technologie suédoise innovante pour économiser l’eau

Le Groupe de la Banque européenne d’investissement et la banque italienne Banca Popolare Sant’Angelo (BPSA) ont signé un accord de garantie, afin d’accorder 10 millions d’euros de prêts à 650 micro-entrepreneurs au cours des cinq prochaines années en Italie. Cet accord a pour objectif prioritaire de donner un meilleur accès au financement aux jeunes, aux femmes entrepreneures et aux start-ups. Cet accord est soutenu par le programme de

l'UE pour l'emploi et l'innovation sociale ([EaSI](#)) et par le Fonds européen pour les investissements stratégiques (EFSI), le cœur du plan **Juncker**. De plus, la Banque européenne d'investissement a signé hier un prêt de 15 millions d'euros avec l'entreprise suédoise Orbital, qui a mis au point une technologie innovante pour les douches. Cette technologie permet d'économiser jusqu'à 90% de l'eau qui serait normalement évacuée, en la nettoyant et en la réutilisant au cours du même cycle de douche, grâce à des capteurs qui analysent la qualité de l'eau jusqu'à 20 fois par seconde. Avec ce financement, Orbital entend franchir une nouvelle étape dans la commercialisation de son produit et investir dans le développement de sa technologie brevetée. En novembre 2018, le plan **Juncker** a déjà mobilisé 360 milliards d'euros d'investissements en Europe, dont 52 milliards d'euros en Italie et 10 milliards d'euros en Suède, et a soutenu 850 000 petites et moyennes entreprises. EU steps up support to displaced and crisis-affected communities in Yemen

The European Commission has adopted a €30 million programme in support of vulnerable communities suffering the effects of prolonged displacement in Yemen. Total EU commitment to support Yemen now stands at €244 million since the start of the conflict in 2015. Commissioner for International Cooperation and Development Neven **Mimica** said: *"The prolonged crisis in Yemen has devastated the lives of millions. Close to 18 million Yemenis don't have their daily meals secured. More than 3 million have had to flee their homes in fear for their lives – some of them only to be displaced a second or third time. The EU is deploying all the instruments available to it in support of the UN-led peace process in Yemen. This new package of assistance will help displaced Yemenis to rebuild their livelihoods and overcome the current crisis."* The package will address the urgent needs of internally displaced populations and vulnerable host communities in Yemen by providing basic services in health, education, protection and legal counselling. EU steps up its assistance for the reconstruction of Iraq

The European Commission has adopted a €56.5 million package to promote sustainable job creation in Iraq and strengthen support to refugees, internally displaced populations and their host communities in Iraq. This measure is part of €400 million pledged by the EU at the Iraq Reconstruction Conference held in Kuwait in February 2018. Commissioner for International Cooperation and Development Neven **Mimica** said: *"The EU is delivering on its commitments made last February at the Iraq Reconstruction Conference in Kuwait. This new support will create opportunities and jobs, helping some of the most vulnerable communities to get back on their feet and rebuild their lives."* Iraq is facing enormous challenges to rebuild the areas affected by

the conflict and assist people in need. The purpose of the programme adopted today is to contribute to the development of the urban areas of Mosul and Basra, and of the rural areas of Nineveh governorate. This will help returning displaced populations, vulnerable youth and women find income opportunities and obtain services to respond to their essential needs. Study: Trade supports over 36 million jobs across the EU

A new study published today by the European Commission highlights the increasing importance of EU exports for job opportunities in Europe and beyond. EU exports to the world are more important than ever, supporting 36 million jobs across Europe, two thirds more than in 2000. 14 million of these jobs are held by women. Since the beginning of this Commission in 2014, the number of jobs supported by exports has increased by 3.5 million. These jobs are on average 12% better paid than jobs in the rest of the economy. Commissioner for Trade Cecilia **Malmström** said: “This study makes it crystal clear that trade means jobs. Exports from the EU to the world support the livelihoods of a vast, and increasing, number of citizens in every corner of Europe. EU trade also supports millions of jobs far beyond EU borders, including in developing countries. Aides d’État: la Commission donne son feu vert à un soutien public de 600 millions d’euros en faveur d’installations solaires innovantes en France

La Commission européenne a autorisé, en application des règles de l’UE en matière d’aides d’État, une mesure visant à soutenir les installations innovantes permettant la production d’électricité à partir de l’énergie solaire en France. Ce régime, doté d’un budget indicatif de 600 millions d’euros, est financé sur le budget de l’État français. Les bénéficiaires seront sélectionnés dans le cadre d’appels d’offres organisés jusqu’en 2019 et les installations sélectionnées bénéficieront d’un soutien sous la forme d’un tarif de rachat (un prix garanti) ou d’une prime venant s’ajouter au prix du marché pendant 20 ans. La Commission a apprécié le régime au regard des règles de l’UE en matière d’aides d’État, en particulier sur la base de ses [lignes directrices de 2014 concernant les aides d’État à la protection de l’environnement et à l’énergie](#). Elle a constaté que le régime français

encouragera le développement de solutions innovantes dans le domaine de l'énergie renouvelable solaire et évitera toute surcompensation pour les bénéficiaires du soutien public et est ainsi parvenue à la conclusion que cette mesure permettra à la France d'augmenter la part d'électricité produite à partir de sources d'énergie renouvelables afin d'atteindre ses objectifs en matière de climat, conformément aux [objectifs environnementaux de l'UE](#), sans fausser indûment la concurrence. M^{me} Margrethe **Vestager**, commissaire chargée de la politique de concurrence, a fait la déclaration suivante: «*Notre futur reposera sur les énergies renouvelables. By supporting sustainable and inclusive economic growth in Iraq, the help is delivering also on the Sustainable Development Goals and the priorities of the Government of Iraq.

Commissioner for International Cooperation and Development Neven **Mimica** said: *“The EU is delivering on its commitments made last February at the Iraq Reconstruction Conference in Kuwait. This new support will create opportunities and jobs, helping some of the most vulnerable communities to get back on their feet and rebuild their lives.”*

The measure adopted today also includes a €15 million contribution to the EU

Regional Trust Fund in Response to the Syrian Crisis, the central aim of which is to provide a coherent and swift response to the needs arising from the massive displacement and returns caused by both the Syrian and the internal Iraqi crises. This action aims to enhance public service delivery in sectors like education and health. It will enhance access to livelihood opportunities for refugees, internally displaced persons, returnees and their communities. It will also uphold the long-standing Iraqi policy of protection and support of people residing and seeking protection in the country.

Today's measure complements the €72.5 million package adopted last October to foster stabilisation and socio-economic development through support to basic service delivery and improved living conditions in conflict areas. This package included measures to reactivate economic activity and entrepreneurship, assistance to facilitate the clearance of lands previously contaminated by explosives, and support to reforms in the energy sector.

These measures are in line with the [2018 EU strategy for Iraq](#) and the [Council Conclusions of 19 May 2017](#) on Iraq as a pilot country for implementing the [Humanitarian-Development Nexus](#), and reaffirm the EU commitments as stated during the Kuwait Conference for the Reconstruction of Iraq. The total EU development assistance to Iraq amounts to €309.8 million since the beginning of the crisis.

Background

The EU has a long history of cooperation with Iraq, working together in fields ranging from political reform and security to education, energy and migration. In the past years, the EU has stood by Iraq as a reliable partner committed to the stability and reconstruction of the country and the region, while at the same time promoting human rights and globally respected values such as democracy and rule of law.

The EU has led the international humanitarian, reconstruction and development efforts for the Iraq crisis, responding to the humanitarian emergency and supporting the stability and development of the country.

EU steps up support to displaced and crisis-affected communities in Yemen

This brings the total EU development assistance to Yemen in 2018 to €71 million. This longer-term support aims to preserve the social fabric, provide increased livelihood opportunities and enhance food and nutrition security. The overall EU commitment in support to resilience and development in Yemen now stands at €244 million since the start of the conflict in 2015.

The package will address the urgent needs of internally displaced populations and vulnerable host communities in Yemen by providing basic services in health, education, protection and legal counselling. It will also help build the capacities of local institutions responsible for monitoring population flows.

Commissioner for International Cooperation and Development Neven **Mimica** said: *“The prolonged crisis in Yemen has devastated the lives of millions. Close to 18 million Yemenis don’t have their daily meals secured. More than 3 million have had to flee their homes in fear for their lives – some of them only to be displaced a second or third time. The EU is deploying all the instruments available to it in support of the UN-led peace process in Yemen. This new package of assistance will help displaced Yemenis to rebuild their livelihoods and overcome the current crisis.”*

Together with the €41 million package adopted in October 2018, this measure is part of the EU’s comprehensive response to build socio-economic resilience and strengthen the food and nutrition security in a country ravaged by years of violent conflict, hunger and epidemics. This new support complements the ongoing first phase of the [Enhanced Rural Resilience in Yemen](#) Programme – a flagship initiative supported by the EU since the beginning of the current crisis to sustain the capacity for resilience of ordinary Yemenis, whose livelihoods and community services have been devastated over the past three years.

These actions are in line with the [Council Conclusions on Yemen of 25 June 2018](#), which put particular emphasis on the situation of vulnerable communities affected by the on-going hostilities and the humanitarian crisis. Throughout 2018, the European Union also allocated €118 million in humanitarian aid for Yemen.

Background

The conflict in Yemen continues to escalate, resulting in the worst humanitarian crisis in the world with unprecedented levels of hunger and poverty, and the spread of preventable diseases. An estimated 22.2 million people in Yemen (out of 28 million total population) need some kind of humanitarian and/or protection assistance, including 11.3 million who are in acute need. An estimated 17.8 million people in the country are food insecure.

While the EU is among the top humanitarian donors to the country, playing a humanitarian role is not enough in the current context. This is why EU assistance also looks beyond the immediate humanitarian needs – which are huge and complex – and considers measures aimed at preserving community resilience and strengthening the ability of ordinary citizens to weather the current crisis.

With an ongoing development portfolio of €244 million, the EU is among the leading development donors in Yemen. EU development programmes cover the fields of food and nutrition security, building the resilience of communities through livelihoods, cash assistance and micro-finance initiatives. The EU is also supporting Yemen's fragile health infrastructure, fighting malnutrition, and working to create a Community Health Workers Network, helping prevent the country's system from collapsing.
