## <u>Grading of beach water quality</u> <u>released</u>

The Environmental Protection Department (EPD) today (April 18) released the latest grading of water quality at 38 gazetted beaches that are open for swimming and one non-gazetted beach (i.e. Discovery Bay\*).

Thirty beaches were rated as good (grade 1), eight as fair (grade 2) and one as poor (grade 3).

\* Discovery Bay is a non-gazetted beach without lifeguard service.

Compared with the grading released last week, Kadoorie Beach and Silverstrand Beach have been upgraded from grade 2 to grade 1. Cafeteria Old Beach has been changed from grade 1 to grade 2; Castle Peak Beach from grade 2 to grade 3.

"The changes are generally within the normal range of fluctuation of the bacteriological water quality of the beaches," an EPD spokesman said.

Under the present grading system, beaches are classified into four grades according to the level of E. coli in the water. Grades are calculated on the basis of the geometric mean of the E. coli counts on the five most recent sampling occasions.

While the ratings represent the general water quality at the beaches, the EPD spokesman reminded members of the public that water quality could be temporarily affected during and after periods of heavy rain. Bathers should avoid swimming at beaches for up to three days after a storm or heavy rainfall.
