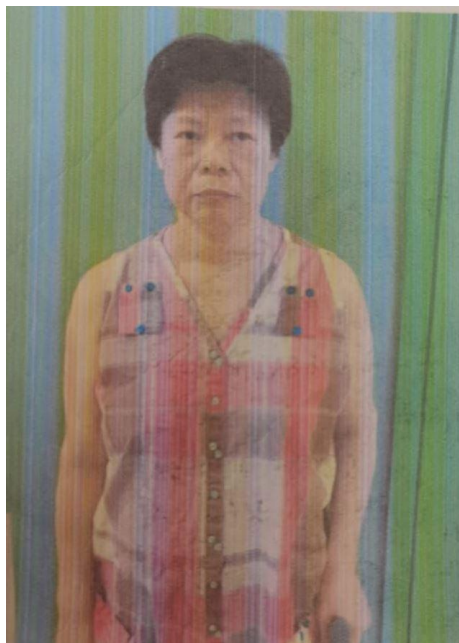
Appeal for information on missing woman in Kwai Chung (with photos)

Police today (October 21) appealed to the public for information on a woman who went missing in Kwai Chung.

Yeung Po-yuk, aged 58, went missing after she left her caring home on Tai Loong Street yesterday (October 20) morning. Her family made a report to Police on the same day.

She is about 1.53 metres tall, 59 kilograms in weight and of medium build. She has a round face with yellow complexion and short hair. She was last seen wearing a white and blue vest, dark shorts, dark sandals as well as carrying a black sling bag and a walking stick.

West Kowloon General Out-patient Clinic resumes service after renovation

The following is issued on behalf of the Hospital Authority:

The spokesperson for the Kowloon West Cluster (KWC) today (October 21) announced that the West Kowloon General Out-patient Clinic will resume service next Monday (October 28) at its original location at G/F, Cheung Sha Wan Government Offices, 303 Cheung Sha Wan Road, Sham Shui Po, upon completion of its renovation works. The service hours will remain unchanged (see Appendix).

Due to the renovation works earlier, the Clinic's services had temporarily been relocated. Following the completion of the renovation works, patients with chronic illnesses requiring regular follow-up have been informed and follow-up appointments have been arranged at the original clinic site. Patients with episodic illnesses can make appointments via the general out-patient clinic (GOPC) telephone appointment system (telephone number: 3157 0121) or the HA Go "Book GOPC" mobile application function as usual.

The spokesperson said, "The KWC has already informed residents in the district of the service arrangements through various channels, including putting up banners and posters. The related District Council has also been informed. Reminder messages will also be added to the GOPC telephone appointment system of the general out-patient clinic and the HA Go 'Book GOPC' mobile application function to inform members of the public of the

service arrangements early."

Postal services to Thailand return to normal

Hongkong Post announced today (October 21) that, as advised by the postal administration of Thailand, mail delivery services previously impacted by heavy rain have returned to normal.

TD to send HKeToll SMS by “#HKeToll” from October 28

The Transport Department (TD) announced today (October 21) that the HKeToll has participated in the SMS Sender Registration Scheme under the Office of the Communications Authority to help the public verify SMS messages issued by the HKeToll. Starting from noon next Monday (October 28), the HKeToll will use "#HKeToll" for issuing messages to local subscribers of mobile services who are HKeToll users, ceasing the use of the sender ID without prefix "#" at the same time.

A spokesman for the TD said that the HKeToll has been progressively implemented at government-tolled tunnels and Tsing Sha Control Area since May 2023. The overall operation has generally been smooth to date, and motorists have been extensively using and adapting to the system. The registered sender ID "#HKeToll" with prefix "#" will enable users to authenticate messages and guard against scams and loss.

The TD reiterated that the HKeToll will not send SMS messages or emails with hyperlinks to vehicle owners for carrying out transactions. Vehicle owners must log in to the HKeToll website (hketoll.gov.hk) or mobile app to pay outstanding tolls online. Members of the public should stay alert when receiving messages without prefix "#" but purportedly issued by the HKeToll or any unidentified messages, and should not reply directly, visit suspicious websites or disclose any personal information to avoid being directed to fraudulent websites to carry out transactions.
