"This is

an extremely valuable report from David Anderson QC. As always, our thoughts are with the families of the bereaved and survivors of these attacks.

"While we

know nine of fifteen plots were prevented, one of the worrying aspects of the report is how many of the terrorists were known to the security services and had been monitored by them. It is possible that more of these may have been preventable.

"MI5 and

Counter-Terrorism police have already identified improved neighbourhood policing as a key part of their prevention strategy. The Government needs to accept that. But they have cut police numbers and police weren't even mentioned in the Budget. The report also says that, after an increase in Counter-Terrorism spending, grant allocations will be cut over the next three years.

"Labour

will restore 10,000 police, who will be focused on community policing. We will

review the resources of the security services to focus on preventing terrorism here in the UK. You can't provide security on the cheap. Labour will

respond appropriately."

We renew our calls on the UK government to play their part in that effort by bringing forward the draft ceasefire resolution for which the UN Security Council has now been waiting for more than a year.

"Even before today, hundreds of thousands of Yemeni children in rebel-held areas were already facing death from famine, disease and the Saudi air strikes and blockade. On top of all that, the creation of a new front

of the civil war within their own cities and towns is another unconscionable cruelty, and the whole world needs to act now to stop their suffering before it

is too late."
